When the third wife is confined to the death chamber, the film cleverly uses a white background to contrast the bloody scene, making this visual presentation easier to touch viewers' deep-seated pity and sympathy, thereby effectively exposing the cruelty and darkness of feudal ethics. Meanwhile, white subtly reflects Songlian's inner despair and suffering. As the story progresses, Songlian gradually descends into the abyss of despair, and the use of all-white tones allows viewers to deeply feel her spiritual transformation and suffering.

2.3. Color contrast and emotional tension

2.3.1. Black-and-white contrast: Prominent tragic effect

Another dominant color in the film, black, symbolizes the failure of hope and the approach of death. Throughout the film, except for the warm tones before Songlian enters Chen's mansion, the remaining scenes are almost shrouded in a black haze, profoundly revealing the heavy reality that women in the old era were powerless to change their tragic fate.

The use of black-and-white contrast pushes the connection between snowfall and death, evil to the extreme. In the black-and-white scenes, the purity and innocence of snowfall form a stark contrast with the darkness and cruelty of Chen's mansion, further highlighting the cruelty and injustice of feudal society. This contrast can not only enhance the film's visual effects and infectivity but also deepen viewers' understanding and reflection on the film's theme and intention.

2.3.2.Red-white contrast: The intertwining of hope and despair

Red and white form a sharp contrast in the film, with red representing hope and power, and white symbolizing despair and helplessness. In the lantern competition among Songlian and the other wives, red becomes the focus and symbol of their struggle. However, as the plot develops, red gradually loses its original meaning and value, becoming a symbol of emptiness and void. White, meanwhile, consistently accompanies Songlian's inner changes, allowing viewers to deeply feel her inner despair and pain.
